Dr. Elizabeth Blackwell (1821-1910) was the first woman to earn a medical degree in the United States and the first woman to be listed on the Medical Register of the General Medical Council for the United Kingdom. She was inspired to become a physician when a friend of hers became ill and remarked that if a woman had taken care of her, she would have done better. Blackwell was turned down by multiple medical schools and was subjected to criticism because of her gender and her "feminine" attributes of empathy and sense of social justice. Eventually, she was accepted to Geneva Medical College as a joke. However, Blackwell endured and became a successful physician, social reformer and pioneer in promoting the education of women in medicine.
